Of the 76,478 cases, 6,678 were sentenced below the guideline range with *Booker*/18 U.S.C. § 3553. Courts may cite multiple reasons for sentencing outside the guideline range; consequently, the total number of reasons cited generally exceeds the total number of cases. In this table, 23,022 reasons were cited for the 6,678 cases. In 171 cases where the SOR was received, there was insufficient documentation provided to determine some of the reasons for the sentence. The "Other" category includes all reasons cited fewer than 75 times among relevant cases. Descriptions of the variables used in this table are provided in Appendix A.
