





## Fiscal Year 2021

- IN FY 2021, 57,287 CASES WERE REPORTED TO THE U.S. SENTENCING COMMISSION.
  - ▶ 17,692 CASES INVOLVED DRUGS.<sup>1</sup>
    - ► 17,520 CASES INVOLVED DRUG TRAFFICKING.<sup>2</sup>
      - SEVEN DRUG TYPES ACCOUNT FOR 97.8% OF DRUG TRAFFICKING OFFENSES.





Sentence Relative to the Guideline Range (%)




### Offender and Offense Characteristics<sup>4</sup>

- 82.2% of drug trafficking offenders were men.
- 44.7% were Hispanic, 26.1% were White, 26.0% were Black, and 3.2% were Other races.
- Their average age was 37 years.
- 82.6% were United States citizens.
- 43.5% had little or no prior criminal history (Criminal History Category I); 5.6% were career offenders.
- Sentences were increased for:
  - possessing a weapon (24.3%);
  - a leadership or supervisory role in the offense (5.9%).
- Sentences were decreased for:
  - minor or minimal participation in the offense (20.4%);
  - meeting the safety valve criteria in the sentencing guidelines (36.7%).
- The top five districts for drug trafficking offenders were:
- Southern District of California (1,604);
- Western District of Texas (998);
- Southern District of Texas (937);
- Northern District of Texas (625);
- District of Arizona (571).

#### Punishment

- The average sentence for drug trafficking offenders was 74 months, but varied by drug type.
- 96.6% were sentenced to prison.
- 67.8% were convicted of an offense carrying a mandatory minimum penalty; of those offenders, 58.8% were relieved of that penalty.



Means of Relief from Mandatory Minimum Penalty for Drug Traffickers

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


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#### Drug Trafficking Offenses —


Change in number of trafficking offenders from FY 2017 to FY 2021:

- Methamphetamine increased 17.2%;
- Crack Cocaine decreased 32.0%;
- Powder Cocaine decreased 26.2%;
- Heroin decreased 33.8%;
- Fentanyl<sup>3</sup> increased 897.6%;
- Oxycodone decreased 61.9%;
- Marijuana decreased 63.7%.







#### **Powder Cocaine Trafficking Offenders**
