




Fiscal Year 2019

- ► IN FY 2019, 76,538 CASES WERE REPORTED TO THE U. S. SENTENCING COMMISSION.
 - 20,085 CASES INVOLVED DRUGS.¹
 - ▶ 19,765 INVOLVED DRUG TRAFFICKING.²
 - ► 42.7% OF THE DRUG TRAFFICKING CASES INVOLVED METHAMPHETAMINE.
 - ► METHAMPHETAMINE TRAFFICKING OFFENDERS HAVE INCREASED BY 30.9% SINCE FY 2015.


Offender and Offense Characteristics³

- 78.0% of methamphetamine trafficking offenders were men.
- 42.1% of methamphetamine trafficking offenders were Hispanic, 40.0% were White, 13.4% were Black, and 4.5% were Other races.
- Their average age was 37 years.
- 82.2% were United States citizens.
- 39.9% had little or no prior criminal history (Criminal History Category I); 6.2% were Career Offenders (§4B1.1).
- The median Base Offense Level in these cases was 32, corresponding to between 1.5 and five kilograms of methamphetamine mixture, or 150 and 500 grams of methamphetamine actual/"ICE."
- Sentences were increased for:
 - possessing a weapon (26.2%);
 - having a leadership/supervisory role in the offense (5.7%).
- Sentences were decreased for:
 - having minor or minimal participation in the offense (22.3%);
 - meeting the safety valve criteria in the sentencing guidelines (34.2%).
- The top five districts for methamphetamine trafficking offenders were:
 - ♦ Southern District of California (862);
 - ♦ Western District of Texas (434);
 - Northern District of Texas (425);
 - District of Arizona (385);
 - ♦ Eastern District of Tennessee (275).

Punishment

- The average sentence for methamphetamine trafficking offenders was 95 months.
- 98.5% were sentenced to prison.
- 81.0% were convicted of an offense carrying a mandatory minimum penalty; of those offenders, 56.7% were relieved of that penalty.

Means of Relief from Mandatory Minimum Penalty for Methamphetamine Traffickers







Within Range

Sentences Relative to the Guideline Range

- Of the 67.7% of methamphetamine trafficking offenders sentenced under the Guidelines Manual:
 - ♦ 41.1% were sentenced within the guideline range.
 - 38.4% received a substantial assistance departure.
 Their average sentence reduction was 46.0%.
 - ◆ 14.2% received an Early Disposition Program (EDP) departure.⁴
 - ♦ Their average sentence reduction was 56.9%.
- 32.3% received a variance; of those offenders:
 - ♦ 98.2% received a below range variance.
 - ♦ Their average sentence reduction was 32.8%.
 - 1.8% received an above range variance.
 - ♦ Their average sentence increase was 44.7%.
- The average guideline minimum and the sentence imposed has increased slightly over the past five years.
 - ♦ The average guideline minimum increased from 119 months in fiscal year 2015 to 131 months in fiscal year 2019.
 - The average sentence imposed increased from 85 months in fiscal year 2015 to 95 months in fiscal year 2019.


Sentence Imposed Relative to the Guideline Range FY 2019






Sentence Relative to the Guideline Range (%)

- 1 Drug offenses include cases where offenders were sentenced under USSG Chapter Two, Part D (Drugs). There were 8,467 methamphetamine offenders sentenced under USSG Chapter Two, Part D (Drugs) in FY 2019.
- 2 Drug Trafficking offenders were sentenced under USSG §§2D1.1 (Drug Trafficking), 2D1.2 (Protected Locations), 2D1.5 (Continuing Criminal Enterprise), 2D1.6 (Use of a Communication Facility), 2D1.8 (Rent/Manage Drug Establishment), 2D1.10 (Endangering Human Life), or 2D1.14 (Narco-Terrorism).
- $_{\it 3}$ Cases with incomplete guideline application information were excluded from analysis.
- 4 "Early Disposition Program (or EDP) departures" are departures where the government sought a sentence below the guideline range because the defendant participated in the government's Early Disposition Program, through which cases are resolved in an expedited manner. See USSG §5K3.1.
