


Powder Cocaine Trafficking Offenses


Fiscal Year 2020

- IN FY 2020, 64,565 CASES WERE REPORTED TO THE U. S. SENTENCING COMMISSION.
 - ▶ 16.501 CASES INVOLVED DRUGS.¹
 - ▶ 16,287 CASES INVOLVED DRUG TRAFFICKING.²
 - ► 16.6% OF DRUG TRAFFICKING CASES INVOLVED POWDER COCAINE.
 - POWDER COCAINE TRAFFICKING OFFENDERS HAVE DECREASED BY 30.3% SINCE FY 2016.

Sentence Length FY 2020



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
Offender and Offense Characteristics³

- 89.9% of powder cocaine trafficking offenders were men.
- 64.4% of powder cocaine trafficking offenders were Hispanic,
 27.3% were Black, 7.0% were White, and 1.3% were Other races.
- Their average age was 38 years.
- 64.9% were United States citizens.
- 60.8% had little or no prior criminal history (Criminal History Category I); 4.2% were Career Offenders (§4B1.1).
- The median Base Offense Level in these cases was 28, corresponding to between 3.5 and five kilograms of powder cocaine.
- Sentences were increased for:
 - possessing a weapon (19.6%);
 - a leadership or supervisory role in the offense (8.6%).
- Sentences were decreased for:
 - minor or minimal participation in the offense (18.3%);
 - meeting the safety valve criteria in the sentencing guidelines (43.5%).
- The top five districts for powder cocaine trafficking offenders were:
 - ◆ District of Puerto Rico (316);
 - ♦ Middle District of Florida (219);
 - Southern District of Florida (191);
 - Southern District of Texas (170);
 - ♦ Southern District of California (152).

Punishment

- The average sentence for powder cocaine trafficking offenders was 66 months.
- 97.5% were sentenced to prison.
- 72.2% were convicted of an offense carrying a mandatory minimum penalty; of those offenders, 64.1% were relieved of that penalty.

Means of Relief from Mandatory Minimum Penalty for Powder Cocaine Traffickers




— Within Range



Sentences Relative to the Guideline Range


- Of the 65.8% of powder cocaine trafficking offenders sentenced under the Guidelines Manual:
 - ♦ 57.8% were sentenced within the guideline range.
 - 28.3% received a substantial assistance departure.
 Their average sentence reduction was 51.8%.
 - 7.0% received an Early Disposition Program (EDP) departure.⁴
 Their average sentence reduction was 54.0%.
- 34.2% received a variance: of those offenders:
 - 95.0% received a below range variance.
 - ♦ Their average sentence reduction was 37.6%.
 - 5.0% received an above range variance.
 - ♦ Their average sentence increase was 41.8%.
- The average guideline minimum slightly decreased and the average sentence imposed fluctuated over the past five years.
 - The average guideline minimum decreased from 94 months in fiscal year 2016 to 88 months in fiscal year 2020.
 - The average sentence imposed increased and decreased throughout the fiscal years. The average sentence was 70 months in fiscal year 2016 and 66 months in fiscal year 2020.

- ¹ Drug offenses include cases where offenders were sentenced under USSG Chapter Two, Part D (Drugs). There were 2,717 powder cocaine offenders sentenced under USSG Chapter Two, Part D (Drugs) in FY 2020.
- ² Drug Trafficking offenders were sentenced under USSG §§2D1.1 (Drug Trafficking), 2D1.2 (Protected Locations), 2D1.5 (Continuing Criminal Enterprise), 2D1.6 (Use of a Communication Facility), 2D1.8 (Rent/Manage Drug Establishment), 2D1.10 (Endangering Human Life), or 2D1.14 (Narco-Terrorism).
- 3 Cases with incomplete sentencing information were excluded from analysis.
- ⁴ "Early Disposition Program (or EDP) departures" are departures where the government sought a sentence below the guideline range because the defendant participated in the government's Early Disposition Program, through which cases are resolved in an expedited manner. See USSG §5K3.1.
