


— Fentanyl Trafficking Offenses —


Fiscal Year 2019

- ► IN FY 2019, 76,538 CASES WERE REPORTED TO THE U.S. SENTENCING COMMISSION.
 - ▶ 20,085 CASES INVOLVED DRUGS.¹
 - ▶ 19,765 INVOLVED DRUG TRAFFICKING.²
 - 4.5% OF DRUG TRAFFICKING CASES INVOLVED FENTANYL.³
 - ► FENTANYL TRAFFICKING OFFENDERS HAVE INCREASED BY 3.940.9% SINCE FY 2015.


Offender and Offense Characteristics⁴

- 84.6% of fentanyl trafficking offenders were men.
- 41.7% of fentanyl trafficking offenders were Black, 33.5% were Hispanic, 23.5% were White, and 1.4% were Other races.
- Their average age was 34 years.
- 85.0% were United States citizens.
- 39.6% had little or no prior criminal history (Criminal History Category I); 8.0% were Career Offenders (§4B1.1).
- The median Base Offense Level in these cases was 26, corresponding to between 160 and 280 grams of fentanyl.
- Sentences were increased for:
 - possessing a weapon (24.2%);
 - having a leadership/supervisory role in the offense (4.6%).
- Sentences were decreased for:
 - having minor or minimal participation in the offense (12.3%);
 - meeting the safety valve criteria in the sentencing guidelines (27.0%).
- The top five districts for fentanyl trafficking offenders were:
 - ♦ Eastern District of Missouri (62):
 - District of New Hampshire (56):
 - District of Massachusetts (52);
 - ♦ Southern District of New York (52);
 - ♦ Northern District of Ohio (44).

Punishment

- The average sentence for fentanyl trafficking offenders was 69 months.
- 96.9% were sentenced to prison.
- 55.9% were convicted of an offense carrying a mandatory minimum penalty; 54.7% of those offenders were relieved of that penalty.



Sentences Relative to the Guideline Range

- Of the 64.2% of fentanyl trafficking offenders sentenced under the Guidelines Manual:
 - ♦ 56.5% were sentenced within the guideline range.
 - 30.9% received a substantial assistance departure.
 Their average sentence reduction was 50.5%.
 - 5.9% received an Early Disposition Program (EDP) departure.⁵
 Their average sentence reduction was 52.8%.
- 35.8% received a variance; of those offenders:
 - 94.3% received a below range variance.
 - ♦ Their average sentence reduction was 41.0%.
 - 5.7% received an above range variance.
 - ♦ Their average sentence increase was 133.1%.
- The average guideline minimum fluctuated over the past three years and the sentence imposed has decreased over the past two years.
 - ♦ The average guideline minimum decreased from 95 months in fiscal year 2017 to 92 months in fiscal year 2019.
 - The average sentence imposed decreased from 80 months in fiscal year 2017 to 69 months in fiscal year 2019.


Sentence Relative to the Guideline Range (%)


Average Guideline Minimum and Average Sentence







1 Drug offenses include cases where offenders were sentenced under USSG Chapter Two, Part D (Drugs). There were 900 fentanyl offenders sentenced under USSG Chapter Two, Part D (Drugs) in FY 2019.

2 Drug Trafficking offenders were sentenced under USSG §§2D1.1 (Drug Trafficking), 2D1.2 (Protected Locations), 2D1.5 (Continuing Criminal Enterprise), 2D1.6 (Use of a Communication Facility), 2D1.8 (Rent/Manage Drug Establishment), 2D1.10 (Endangering Human Life), or 2D1.14 (Narco-Terrorism).

3 In FY19, an additional 101 cases were reported to the Commission involving fentanyl analogue.

4 Cases with incomplete guideline application information were excluded from analysis.

5 "Early Disposition Program (or EDP) departures" are departures where the government sought a sentence below the guideline range because the defendant participated in the government's Early Disposition Program, through which cases are resolved in an expedited manner. See USSG §5K3.1.
