




Fiscal Year 2020

- ► IN FY 2020, 64,565 CASES WERE REPORTED TO THE U.S. SENTENCING COMMISSION.
 - 29.668 OF THESE INVOLVED NON-U.S. CITIZENS.
 - NON-U.S. CITIZENS ACCOUNTED FOR 46.2% OF ALL FEDERAL OFFENDERS IN FY 2020.

Most Common Guidelines for Non-U.S. Citizen Offenders



Offender and Offense Characteristics¹

- 94.3% of non-U.S. citizen offenders were men.
- 95.6% of non-U.S. citizen offenders were Hispanic, 1.9% were White, 1.5% were Black, and 1.0% were Other races.
- Their average age was 36 years.
- 91.3% were illegal aliens, 6.5% were legal aliens, 1.4% were of unknown status, and 0.8% were extradited aliens.
- 69.7% were from Mexico, 9.1% from Honduras, 7.1% from Guatemala, 3.5% from El Salvador, 2.2% from the Dominican Republic, and 8.4% originated from other countries.
- The most common guidelines under which non-U.S. Citizen offenders were sentenced include: Immigration (80.4%); Drug Trafficking (12.1%); Fraud (3.2%); Firearms (1.1%); and Money Laundering (1.0%).²
- 51.6% had little or no prior criminal history (Criminal History Category I);
 - ♦ 20.4% were CHC II:
 - ♦ 16.7% were CHC III;
 - ♦ 6.8% were CHC IV:
 - ♦ 2.8% were CHC V;
 - 1.7% were CHC VI.
- The top five districts for non-U.S. citizen offenders were:
 - Western District of Texas (6,754);
 - ◆ Southern District of Texas (5,292);
 - ◆ District of Arizona (3,296);
 - ◆ District of New Mexico (2,539);
 - Southern District of California (1,141).
- The top five districts where non-U.S. citizen offenders comprised the highest proportion of overall caseload were:
 - Western District of Texas (81.2%);
 - District of New Mexico (80.4%);
 - District of Arizona (78.1%);
 - Southern District of Texas (75.3%);
 - Middle District of Florida (49.6%).

Punishment


- The average sentence for non-U.S. citizen offenders was 17 months.³
- 96.6% were sentenced to prison.
- 10.9% were convicted of an offense carrying a mandatory minimum penalty.




Sentences Relative to the Guideline Range

- Of the 84.8% of non-U.S. citizen offenders sentenced under the Guidelines Manual:
 - 70.9% were sentenced within the guideline range.
 - 20.8% received an Early Disposition Program (EDP) departure.⁴
 Their average sentence reduction was 45.6%.
 - ♦ 4.3% received some other downward departure.
 - ♦ Their average sentence reduction was 42.0%.
 - 3.7% received a substantial assistance departure.
 - ♦ Their average sentence reduction was 51.7%.
- 15.2% received a variance; of those offenders:
 - 92.5% received a downward variance.
 - ♦ Their average sentence reduction was 42.6%.
 - 7.5% received an upward variance.
 - Their average sentence increase was 63.7%.
- The average guideline minimum and average sentence imposed decreased over the past five years.
 - ♦ The average guideline minimum decreased from 34 months in fiscal year 2016 to 22 months in fiscal year 2020.
 - The average sentence imposed decreased from 26 months in fiscal year 2016 to 17 months in fiscal year 2020.

Sentence Imposed Relative to the Guideline Range FY 2020




Sentence Relative to the Guideline Range (%)

- ¹ Cases with incomplete sentencing information were excluded from the analysis.
- ² The most common guidelines under which U.S. citizen offenders were sentenced include: Drug Trafficking (39.1%); Firearms (20.7%); Fraud (10.6%); Immigration (7.5%); Robbery (3.8%); and Child Pornography (3.0%).
- $^{\rm 3}$ The average sentence for U.S. citizen offenders was 62 months.
- ⁴ "Early Disposition Program (or EDP) departures" are departures where the government sought a sentence below the guideline range because the defendant participated in the government's Early Disposition Program, through which cases are resolved in an expedited manner. See USSG §5K3.1.
